WE BELIEVE

1) We believe in the verbal inspiration and inerrancy of the whole Bible, the sixty-six books of the Old and New Testaments, and that it is the all-sufficient and only rule of faith and practice. (Psalms 119:160; II Timothy 3:16- 17).

2) We believe in the personal Triune God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, equal in Divine Perfections. (Matthew 28:19; II Corinthians 13:14).

3) We believe the Genesis and the Bible account of Creation. (Genesis 1:1 - 2:25; John 1:1- 3; Acts 17:24; Hebrews 1:4).

4) We believe in the Deity of Jesus Christ. (John 10:30; John 1:1; John 1:14; II Corinthians 5:19; John 14:8- 9). Therefore, we further believe in the virgin birth and sinless humanity of Jesus Christ. (Matthew 1:18-20; II Corinthians 5:21; Hebrews 7:26; I Peter 2:22).

5) We believe the Holy Spirit is the Divine Administrator for Jesus Christ in His Churches. (Luke 24:49; John 14:16- 17; Acts 1:4, 5, 8; Acts 2:1- 4). The Holy Spirit convicts sinners, regenerates, seals, secures, sanctifies and indwells every believer. (John 3:6; John 16:8-9; Romans 8:9- 11, 16; I Corinthians 6:19- 20; Ephesians 4:30; Titus 3:5)

6) We believe that miraculous spiritual gifts were done away when the Bible was completed and that the vital, abiding spiritual gifts are faith, hope, and love. (I Corinthians 12:1 - 14:40). Therefore, we are opposed to the modern tongues and Charismatic healing movement.

7) We believe that Man was created in the image of God and lived in innocence until he fell by voluntary transgression from his sinless state, the result being that all mankind are sinners by nature (totally depraved). (Genesis 1:26- 27; Genesis 3:6- 24; Romans 3:23; Romans 5:12, 19).

8) We believe in Blood Redemption through the suffering and death of Jesus Christ as substitutionary for all mankind. (Isaiah 53:6; Hebrews 2:9; I Peter 2:24; I Peter 3:18; II Peter 3:9; I John 2:2; I Timothy 4:10; John 3:18, 36).

9) We believe in the bodily resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ and the bodily resurrection of all the saved. (Matthew 28:1- 7; John 5:28- 29; Acts 1:9- 11; I Corinthians 15:42- 58; I Thessalonians 4:13- 18).

10) We believe in the pre-millennial, personal, bodily return of Jesus Christ as the crowning event of the Gentile age. This event will include the resurrection of the saved, and Millennium, and will be followed by the resurrection of the unsaved unto eternal punishment in the lake of fire. (John 14:1- 6; I Thessalonians 4:13- 18; II Thessalonians 2:8; Revelation 19:1- 21; Revelation 20:4- 6; Revelation 20:11- 16; Revelation 21:8).

11) We believe that the depraved alien sinner is saved wholly by grace through faith in Jesus Christ, and the conditions to receiving salvation are repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. (Luke 13:3, 5; John 3:16, 18; Acts 20:21; Romans 6:23; II Corinthians 7:10; Ephesians 2:8- 9).

12) We believe that all who trust Jesus Christ for salvation are eternally secure in Him and shall never perish. (John 3:36; John 5:24; John 10:27- 30; Romans 8:35- 39; Hebrews 10:39; I Peter 1:5).

13) We believe that God deals with believers as His children, that He rewards or chastens them according to their obedience or lack of obedience to His Word. (Matthew 16:27; Matthew 25:14- 23; John 1:12; Hebrews 12:5- 11; II John 8; Revelation 22:12).

14) We believe that Jesus Christ established His church during His ministry on earth. The church is a local, visible assembly of scripturally baptized believers in covenant relationship to carry out the commission of the Lord Jesus Christ. Each church is an independent, self-governing body, and no other ecclesiastical body may exercise authority over it. Jesus Christ gave the Great Commission to the New Testament churches only. He promised the continual existence of His church throughout all ages. (Matthew 4:18- 22; Matthew 16:18; Matthew 28:19- 20; Mark 1:14- 20; Ephesians 3:21).

15) We believe that there are two pictorial ordinances in the Lord's churches: Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Scriptural baptism is the immersion of professed believers in water, administered by the authority of a New Testament church in the name of the Father, Son

and Holy Spirit. The Lord's Supper is a memorial ordinance, restricted to the membership of the church observing the ordinance. (Matthew 28:19- 20; Acts 8:12, 38; Romans 6:4; I Corinthians 5:11- 13; I Corinthians 11:1, 17- 20, 26).

16) We believe that there are two divinely appointed offices in the New Testament church: pastor and deacon. These offices are to be filled by men whose qualifications are set forth in Acts 6:1-7; I Timothy 2:1- 13; Titus 1:5- 11. We further believe that God calls Preachers (II Timothy 1:9).

17) We believe that all associations, fellowships, and committees are and properly should be, servants of, and under control of the churches. (Matthew 20:25- 28; Mark 10:35- 45).

18) We believe in the separation of church and state in religious and civil matters, (Matthew 22:21) and affirm our belief in civil obedience unless the laws and regulations of civil government run contrary to the Holy Scriptures. (Romans 13:1- 7; I Peter 2:13- 15; Acts 5:29).

19) We believe that Satan is a fallen angel, the archenemy of God and man. He is the unholy god of this world, and that his ultimate destiny is the eternal lake of fire. (Isaiah 14:12- 15; Luke 10:18; Matthew 25:41; II Corinthians 4:4; Ephesians 6:10- 18; Revelation 20:10; I Peter 5:8).

20) We believe that at the instant of death, the unbeliever's soul and spirit are cast into hell and the believer's soul and spirit are taken into the presence of Jesus Christ in Heaven. (Luke 16:19- 31; II Corinthians 5:8).

Objectives

The West Florida Baptist Institute is a Bible and Church Training institution established in 1983, under the Ownership and Direction of First Missionary Baptist Church of Pensacola, Florida. The purpose is not to make preachers but to train people as Ministers, Missionaries and Christian Workers.

It is not the purpose of W.F.B.I. to teach secular courses. Those courses taught that are not Bible related are all of a practical nature and are offered to assist the Christian Worker in his or her field of Labor.

Sponsorship/Co-sponsorship

The West Florida Baptist Institute is under the direction of Magnolia Springs Baptist Church of Mobile, Alabama. Magnolia Springs Baptist Church has three trustees and there are five at-large trustees. These eight trustees assist in making the decisions pertaining to the general operation of the West Florida Baptist Institute. Churches throughout the American Baptist Association and interested parties help to finance the Institute with offerings and gifts. The school and her administrators are always willing to listen to the wise counsel of other churches and their elders.

All legal documents pertaining to W.F.B.I. must be signed and approved by the trustees of West Florida Baptist Institute, Inc., Pensacola, Florida.

Opportunities

The West Florida Baptist Institute is located in Pensacola, Florida. This is a favorable location because it affords an excellent opportunity for ministerial training to preachers living in Louisiana, Southern Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, and North Florida.

The job opportunities are good in this area making it possible for a person to work while attending school. This area is a growing area and bringing in new industry making all this possible.

There is a good base of churches in this area making it possible for a person to work in a church and receive good practical experience while in school.

Conduct

Students of the West Florida Baptist Institute are encouraged to be conscientious with regards to their morals, debts, and studies. They are expected to be loyal, under God, to the United States of America. They should conduct themselves in a manner becoming a Christian.

Attendance at the West Florida Baptist Institute is a privilege, not a right, and persons not conducting themselves in a Christian manner will be dismissed as students.

Absenteeism

Absences due to illness, injury, emergencies, death in the family and funerals are considered as excused absences and make up work will be assigned by the instructor.

Absences due to pleasure trips, class revival meetings, outside business, etc., are not considered as excusable and are not tolerated.

Make up work will be assigned on the following basis:

A maximum of seven absences (without make-up work) plus five additional absences which will require make-up work of no less than 500 words per class per day on the three-day schedule. A maximum of five absences (without make-up work) plus three additional absences which will require make-up work of no less than 500 words per day on the two day schedule.

Veterans Attendance Policy

Excused absences will be granted for extenuating circumstances only. Excused absences will be substantiated by entries in students

files. Early departures, class cuts, tardies, etc., for any portion of an hour will be counted as a full hour of absence.

Students exceeding two and one-half (2 ½) days unexcused absences in a calendar month will be terminated for unsatisfactory attendance.

Tardiness

A student arriving after the opening of class will be counted tardy. If the student is later than fifteen minutes, he shall be counted absent. Four tardies shall be counted as one absence. Tardies accumulate for the semester.

Grading

Grade point averages are reckoned from the following standard:

A = 95-100%	4 grade points
B = 85-94%	3 grade points
C = 75-84%	2 grade points
D = 70-74%	1 grade points
F = Below 70%	0 grade points
I = Incomplete	0 grade points
W = Withdrawal	0 grade points

Academic Probation

All students must maintain a minimum grade point average of 2.0 to be eligible for graduation. Students who fall below the 2.0 grade point minimum during a semester will be placed on probation and given one semester to raise their grade point to the required level. If they fail to do so, they will be dismissed from the school for a period of at least one semester. Readmittance will be only by approval of the Registrar.

Examinations

All students are required to take the semester examinations and any other examinations scheduled by the instructor. Failure to take the final examination in any course constitutes a failure of the subject.

Make-up examinations may be taken at the instructor's option within six weeks after the regularly scheduled date of the examination. Final examination grades, combined with class work and other required work, constitute the student's final grade.

Space

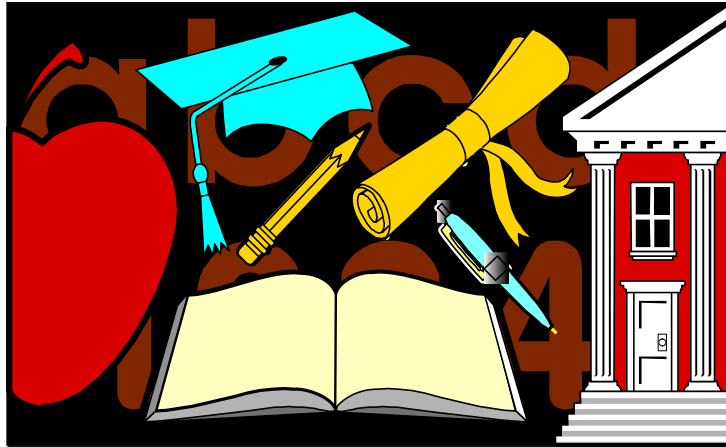
West Florida Baptist Institute occupies its own building which is located at 6812 Lillian Highway in Pensacola, Florida. The building contains approximately 5000 square feet which includes office space, classrooms, chapel, library and a kitchen. The bookstore is in the developmental stages but is able to provide the students with the materials they need.

Facilities

West Florida Baptist Institute is housed in its own facilities which is located at 6812 Lillian Highway, Pensacola, Florida. This building was purchased in 1990, after a concentrated effort by many churches and individuals. The building is a two story construction of brick and block and contains over 5,000 square feet of space. It has central heat and air conditioning. The facility has been renovated both outside and inside. There is adequate space for all phases of the school operation. There is also a paved lighted parking lot. The school also has an in-house printing ministry. This phase of this ministry has a print shop and warehouse that contains 3000 square feet of space.

ADMISSIONS

1. One must give evidence of seriousness and commitment to Jesus Christ as personal Savior and Lord.
2. One may be required to take the American College testing program or the College Entrance Examination Board program.
3. One should have at least a “C” average and be a high school graduate or the equivalent.
4. Individuals transferring from other schools must present a statement of honorable withdrawal.
5. West Florida Baptist Institute does not discriminate against any individual on the basis of race, color, sex, or national or ethnic origin in administration of educational policies, admission policies, or other school administered programs.

Entrance Requirements

Applicants to West Florida Baptist Institute may be admitted on any of the following basis:

1. High School graduate having 15 units of acceptable secondary school work. (“C” average or better)
2. High School equivalency diploma.
3. Satisfactory USAFI General Education Development Test scores with or without a diploma (applicable primarily to veterans).
4. Satisfactory scores achieved on examinations of the American College Testing or similar recognized organization.
5. Other applicants may be admitted as special students without meeting the above requirements. After completing 3 courses (9 semester hours) as a matriculant, the student will be accepted to full standing and can enter any degree program that is

available, and the 9 semester hours will be granted toward the degree.

6. The student must request their High School or College to forward their transcripts to West Florida Baptist Institute.
7. Students who have not graduated from High School or have a high school equivalency certificate, may enroll but will not be eligible for graduation.

Re-Entrance Policy

Students who have been dismissed for unsatisfactory progress may petition the school to be readmitted after one grading period has elapsed. Veteran students may be recertified to the VA only if there is a reasonable likelihood that the individual student will be able to maintain satisfactory progress in the future.

Record

Permanent student progress records are maintained by West Florida Baptist Institute. Written grade reports will be furnished to students at the end of each semester. Students desiring a transcript of records sent to other institutions will be required to make a request to the Dean of records. A small fee is required for mailing and handling purposes. No transcript will be issued if the student has not settled all financial obligations. No permanent grades will be posted until all financial obligations are met.

Course Numbers And Letter Codes

Course numbers consist of two letters and five digits. The letters identify the department. The first digit indicates the year, the third and fourth digit indicates the course sequence. The fifth letter indicates the semester hours. The letter designations denote semester, i.e., A. First Semester; B. Second Semester; C. Third (Night).

Registration

A student should register during the regular registration at the beginning of each new semester. Late registration will continue for two weeks following the opening day, but a late registration fee is charged all students registering after the scheduled registration days. Advance registration is frequently allowed especially for continuing students. New students may be given an achievement test at this time.

Tuition And Fees

All changes must be voted on by the faculty and trustees. Some scholarships may be available, for qualified students.

A registration fee of \$50.00 per semester is required of all students. Late registration fee is \$5.00. There is a \$5.00 one time charge for cap and gown. Graduates are permitted to keep their tassels.

Refund Policy

1. A refund request must be in writing.
 2. The refund of the unused portion of tuition, fees and other charges for students will be made on the following pro rata basis:
 - During the first week of classes.....90%
 - During the next three weeks of classes.....80%
 - During the fifth and sixth week of class...55%
 - During the seventh and eighth week of class....30%Registration fee is not refundable.
After the eighth week there will be no refund.
- A grade of W (withdraw) will be posted for those who drop a course correctly.

Refund Policy For Veterans

The refund of the unused portion of tuition, fees, and other charges for eligible persons who fail to enter a course or withdraw or discontinue prior to completion will be made for all amounts paid which exceed the approximate pro rata portion of the total charges that the length of the completed portion of the course bears to the total length of the course. The proration will be determined on the ratio of the number of days or hours of instruction completed by the student to the total number of instructional days or hours in the course.

Text Books

West Florida Baptist Institute will help the student in the procuring of text books. Each student is responsible for purchasing his or her own books. No grades are issued unless bookstore purchases are paid up to date.

Class Changes

Every effort will be made at the time of enrollment to place students in the proper classes. The last date for a student to change his schedule will be two weeks after the beginning of a new semester. Any changes in schedule must be applied for in writing to the faculty.

Withdrawal

A student who finds it necessary to withdraw from a class or from school should report to the Dean or Registrar and complete the proper forms. Failure to do so will result in a failing grade on the student's transcript. When withdrawing properly, a grade of W (withdraw) will be posted in the record.

Transfers

Acceptable work performed toward certificates or diplomas at other schools affiliated with the American Baptist Association of Theological Schools are honored by the West Florida Baptist Institute. The application of work to the program at the West Florida Baptist Institute is worked out by the Dean in consultation with the student.

A student who has achieved the necessary transcript requirements while doing work at another school in the American Baptist Association may be considered as a candidate for a degree or diploma from the West Florida Baptist Institute when he has completed a minimum of 32 semester hours of resident work in the West Florida Baptist Institute.

In addition to this, the diploma candidate must write an acceptable thesis applicable to the degree toward which he is working. The subject of this thesis must be approved by the Dean prior to being written.

Work completed at other institutions of higher learning will be considered on a case by case basis. A maximum of 32 semester hours will be transferable toward any degree program.

Transfer For Veterans' Previous Training

Credit for previous training will be evaluated and granted, if appropriate, by West Florida Baptist Institute. Training time will be shortened and tuition reduced proportionately with the VA and the Veteran or eligible person notified.

State and Veterans transfer of credits from this institution to other institutions is at the discretion of the receiving institution.

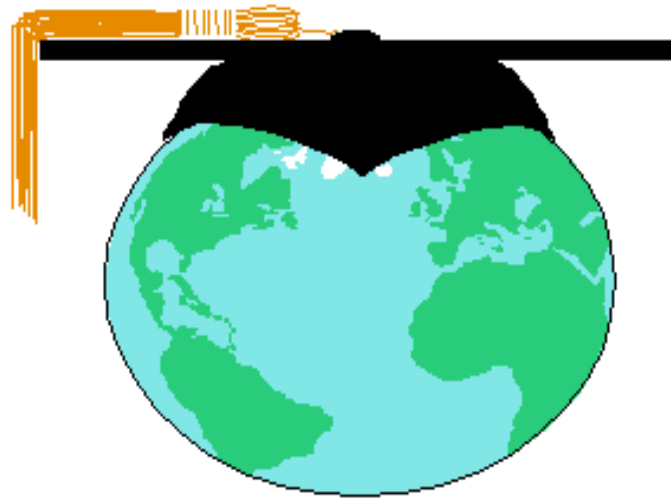
WFBI offers a complete Master of Christian Apologetics degree 100% online. WFBI's online degree program offers the following benefits:

The special Master program is designed to meet the needs for Biblical Counseling and to meet the qualification for certain Chaplain positions. The intended thesis material must be presented to the faculty for approval.

DOCTORIAL PROGRAM

The Doctoral program at W. F. B. I. is designed for students who have received their Master of Theology Degree. In order to qualify as a doctoral candidate, one must be elected by the faculty and complete certain assigned courses.

The student must do extensive research work under the guidance of an assigned faculty member and submit an acceptable dissertation of at least 50,000 words on an approved subject. The student must draw from and quote from no less than 25 references.

Teaching requirements will also be made on an individual basis.

THESIS REQUIREMENTS

The Master of Theology, Thesis and The Doctor of Theology Dissertation is to be written on an approved Bible subject. The subject must be turned in to the Dean by October 1st of the graduate year. Upon approval by the Dean and President, the student then has until April 1st to complete his Thesis and/or Dissertation and turn it in for grading. Each must be presented in correct form as required by W.F.B.I. Progress reports need to be made to the Dean periodically.

ASSOCIATE OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The degree of Associate of Christian Education is designed for the students who have satisfactorily completed the prescribed 60 Semester hours of work with a grade average of 2.0 or better. The diploma may be awarded to those students who participate in the non-ministerial program.

BACHELOR OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The degree of Bachelor of Christian Education is designed for the students who have satisfactorily completed the prescribed 120 Semester hours of work with a grade point average of 2.0 or better. The diploma may be awarded to those students who participate in the non-ministerial program.

ASSOCIATE OF BIBLE

The degree of Associate of Bible will be awarded to those students who have satisfactorily completed the prescribed 60 Semester hours of work with a grade point average of 2.0 or better. The degree may be awarded to those students who participate in either the English Bible program or the Theology program.

BACHELOR OF BIBLE

The degree of Bachelor of Bible will be awarded to those students who have satisfactorily completed the prescribed 120 Semester hours of work with a grade point average of 2.0 or better.

MASTER OF BIBLE

The degree of Master of Bible will be awarded to those students who have satisfactorily completed the prescribed 160 Semester hours of work with a grade point average of 2.0 or better. With additional work as required

BACHELOR OF THEOLOGY

The degree of Bachelor of Theology will be awarded to those students who have satisfactorily completed the prescribed 120 Semester hours of work with a grade point average of 2.0 or better.

MASTER OF THEOLOGY

A Master of Theology will be awarded to those students who have earned a Bachelor level degree and have satisfactorily completed the additional requirements.

The student must have a cumulative G. P. A. of 2.50 or better in undergraduate studies and must maintain a G. P. A. of 3.00 or better in graduate studies. In addition to the prescribed hours of graduate courses, the student must submit an acceptable thesis of not less than 25,000 words on a Bible subject. The subject must be turned into the Dean by October 1st of the graduate year. Upon approval by the Dean and President, the student then has three years to complete his/her thesis and turn it in for grading. All thesis must be in correct form as required by W. F. B. I. The proper number of required words is a must. In addition to Scripture quotations or references, at least 15 different sources must be quoted. Progress reports must be made to the Dean periodically.

MASTER OF DIVINITY

The Master of Divinity with a concentration in Counseling is designed to meet the every growing needs in churches, pastor care, and Christian ministries. It requires ninety hours of approved work above the Bachelor of Theology. There are certain entries that are considered where an individual seeks to enroll where there is an earned Bachelor degree. These individuals can enter on an accelerated program where, upon meeting the theology requires of the Institution, they can work toward the Masters of Counseling.

MASTER OF DIVINITY

The master of Divinity with a concentration in Apologetics is a special program designed to meet the needs for individuals who have a desire to explore and expand their knowledge in addressing the many questions regarding belief and faith. It requires ninety hours of approved work above the Bachelor of Theology. There are certain entries that are considered where an individual seeks to enroll where there is an earned Bachelor degree. These individuals can enter on an accelerated program where, upon meeting the theology requires of the Institution, they can work toward the Masters in Apologetics.

DOCTORIAL OF THEOLOGY

The Doctor of Theology is designed for students who have received their Master of Theology Degree. In order to qualify as a doctoral candidate, one must be elected by the faculty and complete certain assigned courses.

The student must do extensive research work under the guidance of an assigned faculty member and submit an acceptable dissertation of at least 50,000 words on an approved subject.

Teaching requirements will also be made on an individual basis.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

BIBLE DEPARTMENT

Bi 10023 A & C: The Beginnings

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An exegetical study will be given to the book of Genesis. A detailed study is given to the beginnings or generation of things. It sets forth several beginnings: That of the world, of life, of domestic relations, of institutions, of moral order, of sin and its consequences, of the scheme of redemption, of nations, and of the Messianic nation.

Bi 10033 A, B. & C: Bible Analysis

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An introductory study will be given to the proper methods of Bible interpretation. The study includes: how we got the Bible, Bible divisions, Miracles, Tongues, the Baptism of the Holy Spirit and Bible Typology.

Bi 10042 A, B & C: Writings of John

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An exegetical study will be given to the Gospel of John and the Epistles of John. This study will emphasize the Gospel of belief and how the Epistles were written against prevailing heresies.

Bi 10052 A: The Conquerings

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

An exegetical study will be given to the books of Joshua, Judges, and Ruth. We will study the Hebrew Nations conquest and settlement

in Canaan. The study of Ruth in the time of conquest indicates that even in the darkest periods, there were always some homes where the choicest values of life were preserved.

Bi 20063 A, B, & C: New Testament Survey

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

The New Testament Times will be studied: The political, the social, the economical and the Religious. The study will also cover how the New Testament got its name, and contents, the life of Christ, the establishment of the church and the problems that arose in the early church.

Bi 20073 A, B, & C: Early Church Expansion

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An exegetical study of the origin and early development of the church will be given to the Gospels and the book of Acts. Special attention is given to the chronology of the first church established and the expansion of the Jewish church into the subsequent Gentile churches.

Bi 20083 A & C: The Wanderings

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

A comprehensive study will be given to the books of Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy. Exodus is so named because it is chiefly concerned with the oppression and departure of the Hebrews from Egypt. Leviticus sets forth the laws of worship (priesthood, offerings and holiness). Numbers is composed of narratives giving vivid experiences of their journey toward Canaan. Deuteronomy the restatement of the covenant to a new generation.

Bi 20092 A, B & C: Great Doctrinal Epistles

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An exegetical study will be given to the books of Galatians, Thessalonians and Romans. Emphasis is placed on the doctrinal debate between Law and Grace, the return of the Lord and the revelation of the righteousness of God to man.

Bi 20102 A: The Kingdom

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

A comprehensive study will be given to the books of Samuel, Kings, and Chronicles. This study will cover more than one hundred years of Hebrew history. During this period, the Hebrew nation attained its highest rank as a nation of wealth and fame. A close look at all areas of Life: Economical, educational, political, social, and religious, will be considered.

Bi 30113 A, B, & C: Old Testament Survey

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An outline of the Old Testament will be studied. The study will include the Pentateuch, the time of the Judges, the United Kingdom, and both the major and minor prophets.

Bi 30122 A & B: Prison Epistles

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

An exegetical study will be given to the books of Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians and Philemon. Special attention is given to the teachings of the Apostle Paul concerning: The Churches, the walk and joy of believers, the pre-eminence of Christ in creation, and redemption.

Bi 20133 A, B & C: Pre-Exile Prophets

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An exegetical study of the prophetic books written before the exile including Jonah, Obadiah, Joel, Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah and Jeremiah. Emphasis will be placed on the chronology and history of Israel, her downfalls, her place in Bible prophecy and on contemporary developments in the Middle East.

Bi 30142 A & B: Pastoral Epistles

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

An exegetical study of the epistles of Timothy and Titus will deal with matters of organizational, devotional, official, and doctrinal problems.

Bi 30153 A, B & C: Synoptic Gospels

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An exegetical study will be given to the three early Gospels, Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Special attention is given to the difference in writing style and conformation of their stories.

Bi 30152 A& B: Exile Prophets

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

A comprehensive study will be made concerning the Gentile governments leading up to the Anti-Christ as given by Daniel, Ezekiel and Esther.

Bi 40163 A & C: Bible Prophecy

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This study will deal with the events prior to and surrounding the second coming of Christ.

Bi 40172 A, B, & C: General Epistles

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An exegetical study will be given to the books of Hebrews, James, Peter and Jude. A detailed study showing how God's revelation in

Christ is superior to the revelation that came through The Law, that faith is exemplified during heretical times.

Bi 40182 A, B, & C: Poetical Books

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This study will include Job and Psalms. Emphasis is give to the historical figure of Job and his test of faith. This also includes a divisional study of Psalms, the songbook of Israel.

Bi 40192 A, B, & C: The Writings

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This study will involve an exegesis of the books of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes and Song of Solomon; with emphasis on the parallelism of Proverbs; the Koheleth or Preacher and his wisdom in Ecclesiastes; and the three interpretation, the literal, the allegorical and the typical, will be examined of the Song of Solomon.

Bi 40193 A, B & C: Apocalypse

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An exegetical study is given to the Revelation. A comprehensive study of the natural divisions making it less difficult to understand its contents, with emphasis on the unities, chronology, parallels, and contrasts of the book.

Bi 40202 A & B: Post Exile Prophets

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This is an exegetical study of the prophets listed, with special emphasis placed on God's dealing with His people Israel and their restoration as a nation. This will include the books of Ezra, Haggai, Zechariah, Nehemiah, and Malachi.

Bi 40222 A & B: Life of Paul

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This course encompasses a historical study of the life of the great missionary and apostle to the Gentiles. His conversion, call, revelations, methods, works, and messages are given a detailed study and analysis.

Bi 50233 A, B, & C: Systematic Theology I

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This study consists of the subjects; Theology Proper; Christology; Pneumatology; Angelology; Demonology; Satanology

Bi 50243 A, B, & C: Systematic Theology II

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This study consists of; Bibliology; Anthropology; Hamartiology; Soteriology; Eschatology; Ecclesiology.

Bi 50053 A & B: Church Administration

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

An exegetical study of the books of 1 and 2 Corinthians. Illustrating how the early churches dealt with problems of that day.

Bi 50252 A: Biblical Figures of Speech

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This course is a scientific study of figures of speech which are a basis of biblical interpretation.

Bi 50253 A, B, & C: Hermeneutics

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course is a scientific interpretation of the Bible. It will explain and illustrate the various principles which must be followed in order for a person to understand the Word of God.

MASTER OF DIVINITY LEVEL COURSE

Note: Master of Divinity level courses require extensively more reading, research and writing than the undergraduate courses. The Master's courses will further equip the student to apply a proper hermeneutics to Scripture with the result being correct exegesis and sound biblical exposition.

AP: Apologetics

Ap -51001

This course consist of laying a foundation for a systematic and rational defense of the Christian faith. In addition to growing stronger in their own, the student will become equipped to defend the Christian faith from all attacks. Such issues as absolute truth, God's existence, the reliability of the Scripture, the problem of evil and science.

Ap - 51002 Biblical Apologetics

This course provides a study and defense of the inspiration, veracity and inerrancy of the bible. Archeological, history, geographical, linguistic and cultural issues are examined.

Ap 51003 Theological Apologetics

This course defends the orthodox conservative theology of Christianity. The course deals with challenges and heresies from both inside and outside of Christianity. Topics such as the nature of God, the nature of Jesus and God's sovereignty will be covered in-depth.

Ap 61002 Issues on Apologetics

This course offers an in-depth look at the methodology of apologetics. Methods such as classical, evidential, historical and propositional will be discussed. The strengths and limits of each method will be evaluated as well as the relationship of faith and reason.

HI Church History

Hi 51001-A Church History

This is a study of the early church expansion and progress through the early and medieval periods. It investigates the reason and purpose for the persecution during these periods.

Hi 61001 Church History

This is a study of the expansion and progress through the reformation and modern periods. It investigates how the early church prospered through the challenge of diversity.

GR Language Research

Gr 51001-A, B

This course widens the fundamental study of the New Testament language. It expands the research of different words and how they apply to their usage.

He 60001-A, B

This is an advanced study of the origin of the Biblical language found in the Old Testament. It explores the usage of all the Old Testament languages.

PH: Philosophy

Ph- 50001 World views

This is an introduction to the major world views including theism, deism, atheism, pantheism, panentheism, finite godism and polytheism. This course evaluates world views and the philosophy that forms them—metaphysics, epistemology, ethics and theology. The Christian world view (theism) will be demonstrated to be superior to all other world views.

PH- Philosophy of Religion

Ph-60002

Philosophy answers the deep questions of life on a metaphysical and epistemological level. This course will study the philosophy behind religion. In particular, it will examine Christian Philosophy and compare it to other philosophies.

PH-Logic

Ph-60003

Logic is the foundation to all thought. This course will teach the student the laws of logic and argumentation. It will also include a study of Paul's writings to evaluate the logic he uses. The book of Romans demonstrates that Paul is a master logician.

TH: Theology**Th-Systematic Theology I**

TH- 52001

Systematic Theology is a study of all Scripture on a given subject. This course covers Theology Proper (God), Bibliology (Bible), Analogously (angels and Satan), Christology (Christ) and Pneumatology (Holy Spirit).

Th-Systematic Theology II

TH-52002

This course covers, Anthropology (man), Hamartiology (sin), Soteriology (salvation).

Th-Systematic Theology III

TH-62003

This course covers Ecclesiology (Church) and Eschatology (last things).

Th-Advance Theology

TH-62004

Prerequisite: Th 62001, TH-62002, TH-62003

This is an advance study of theology systems as a whole such as; Roman Catholic Theology, Lutheran Theology, Anabaptist Theology,

Reformed Theology, Arminian Theology, Wesleyan Theology, Liberal Theology, Dispensational Theology and Black Theology.

Th-Advanced Soteriology

Th-62005

Prerequisite: Th 62001, TH-62002, TH-62003

This is an advanced study of Soteriology in which the nature and condition of salvation will be evaluated from different theological perspectives such as Catholicism, Reformed Theology and Dispensational Theology and compared to Scripture. The implications of Arminianism and Calvinism will be advanced.

TH-Advance Ecclesiology

Th-53001

Prerequisite: Th 62001, TH-62002, TH-62003

This is an advanced biblical study of Ecclesiology in which the nature, origin polity, officers, ordinances and purpose of the church will be evaluated biblically and compared to respective theological systems and denominations. A strong emphasis on how the Bible defines Israel, the Church and the Kingdom will be considered.

TH-Advanced Eschatology

Th-65001

This is an advanced study of Eschatology in which the implications and timing of the rapture, tribulation and millennial kingdom will be evaluated. An in-depth exegetical study of the Olivet Discourse will also be included.

BI: Bible

BI-Hermeneutics

Bi-55001

This is study of the methodology of the science of interpreting Scripture. Great emphasis will be put on the literal, grammatical and historical method.

BI-Advanced Hermeneutics

Bi-65002

Prerequisite: Bi 65001-A

This is an advanced study of hermeneutics that will demonstrate that different hermeneutical methods contrary doctrines. Denominations are formed largely on interpretational methods.

BI: Old Testament Survey

Bi-56001

This course requires a survey of every book in the Old Testament. The student will determine such things as the author, audience, purpose and theology of each book. An outline of each book will be created by the student.

TH-New Testament Survey

Th-67001

This course requires a survey of every book of the New Testament. The student will determine such things as the author, audience, purpose and theology of each book. An outline of each book will be created by the student.

BI-Daniel

Bi-65003

A concentrated study in the exile, life and ministry of Daniel as well as the progress of the exiled Jews and their relationship to the Babylonians. It explores the nation of Israel and their future expansion.

BI-Apocolalyps

Bi-65004-A,B

A Comprehensive study in the book of Revalation and prophecy. as it relates to the endtime events.

BI-Ezekiel

Bi-65005

This study consist of an exegesis of the book of Ezekiel. It explores the relationship of the prophet to the captives and their uture recognition as a nation. It examines the effect of the great prophecy relative to the nation of Israel.

BI-Isaiah

Bi-65006-A,B

This is a comprehensive examination of the entire book of Isaiah. It entails a verse by verse exegesis and researches the reaction of the people to the prophet. It also examines, in detail, the prophecy of the coming Messiah.

BI-Jeremiah

Bi-65007-A,B

This study of Jeremiah consist of a verse by verse examination of the whole book. It is a research regarding the prophet and his relationship to the nation of Judah prior to the captivity. It also examines the prophecy of their return to Jerusalem.

BI-Romans**Bi-55002**

This is an expand study in the book of Romans. It investigates the writing, the problems that existed in the church as they might relate to the church of present times, and how they might be solved.

BI- Thessalonians

Bi-65008

This study involves a complete verse by verse study of both book addressed to the church a Thessalonica. It focuses on the theology, the fellowship and steadfastness of the church.

PA: Pastoral

PA-Expository Preaching

Pa-68001

This is a study of the nature of biblical exposition and principles of message construction. Attention is given to the basic materials of the message, methods of preparation, effective deliver and problems of exposition. The goal of expiatory preaching is to ensure we have the authors intended meaning in the text (exegesis). Non-preachers will prepare lessons rather than sermons.

PA-Ministerial Practicalities

Pa-69001

This course defines the manner in which a pastor deals with the congregation, people of a certain community and the public at large. The pastor's first responsibility is to the church which he has been called to minister.

PA-Church Administration

Pa-61010

The course examines the the operation of the early church during the rapid expansion through out Asia Minor. It examines the vast problems which occurred in the early churches and determine the instruction given regarding the handling of these situation.

CU: Counseling

CU-Introduction to Counseling

Cu-61020

This course introduces the student to commonly accepted principle of psychology and counseling. A study of the approach to counseling the Christian versus the non-Christian will be explored.

CU-Methodology of Counseling

Cu-61030

This course studies the different methodology used in counseling. Emphases will be put on biblical counseling.

CU-Marriage and Family Counseling

Cu-61040

This course investigates the critical dynamics of God's divine institution of marriage. Applicable counseling will be based on the roles God has given in marriage and family

Cu-Pastoral Counseling

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This course studies the roles and methods of pastoral counseling.

CU-Issues on Counseling

Cu-61060

This course studies contemporary issues facing the counselor.

<i>EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT</i>

Ed 10012 A & B: Teaching Techniques

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

The different methods of teaching are considered and the best types and forms are explored for certain topics.

Ed 20022 A & B: Business Administration

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This course is a combination of practical mathematics and legal components.

Ed 30032 A: Church Polity

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This course will include a study of the different kinds of church government and the Biblical example of the correct form used.

Ed 40042 A & B: Computer Science

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

Computer Science is a course designed to introduce the student to the principles and operation of PC computers. Several different programs will be taught so as to give the student a wide range of options in the operation of PCs.

<i>ENGLISH DEPARTMENT</i>

En 10013 A, B, & C: English

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course is a comprehensive study of the principles of correct usage to the parts of speech. Application of these principles is given in oral and written exercises, including analysis, diagramming and written themes. This study also includes sentence structure, grammar, and correct punctuation.

En 20023 A, B, & C: English

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course is a more comprehensive study of English grammar.

En 30033 A, B, & C: English

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course is an advanced study of paragraph and theme writing. It prepares the student for the art of writing.

En 40043 A & C: Thesis Writing

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

The gathering of materials and documenting one's hypothesis is presented in this course. The form Bibliography is carefully presented. Time is also given on how to obtain permission to quote from another's writings.

En 50063 A, B, & C: Etymology

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course is designed to show how modern words are developed from ancient roots in the Hebrew, Latin, Greek, Old English, French, and other languages. It shows how to expand one's understanding by observation of prefixes, suffixes, etc.

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Gr 20013 A, B, & C: Greek

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This is a beginner course in elementary New Testament Greek. A study of the alphabet, vocabulary, consonants and vowels, verbs, conjugation and noun declension are presented in this course.

Gr 30023 A, B, & C: Greek

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course deals with the five points of grammar, vocabulary building, syntax, prepositions, adverbs, and classification of words.

Gr 40033 A, B, & C: Greek

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

The practical use of the Greek in study and sermon building. The Greek New Testament is used as a text book.

Gr 50043 A, B, & C: Greek

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

Research, translating, and reading will be the characteristics of this course.

He 30013 A, B, & C: Hebrew

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course deals with foundation Hebrew. It begins with the alphabet, the vowels, gutturals, syllables, articles, and the writing of the articles and prepositions and conjunction.

He 40023 A, B, & C: Hebrew

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course will take the student into a deeper study of the grammar as well as reading and translating from the Old Testament scriptures.

He 50033 A, B, & C: Hebrew

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

Research, translating and reading will be the characteristics of this course.

<i>HISTORY DEPARTMENT</i>

Hi 10013 A, B, & C: Bible by Ages

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

A study of the Bible will be given by ages: Pre-Adamic, Adamic, Noahic, Abrahamic, the Law (Moses), the Church, the Millennial, and the Heaven ages.

Hi 20023 A, B, & C: Church History

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course is a survey of the origin, doctrines, and practices of the New Testament church from the time of Christ to the present day.

Hi 30033 A & C: Ancient History

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This is a course which combines the general history of nations and peoples with that of Biblical history.

Hi 40043 A & C: Bible Versions

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

A thorough study is made of the history and different versions of the English Bible. Inspiration, canonization, and transmission from the original languages and ancient versions are included in this study.

Hi 50053 A & C: Philosophy of Religion

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course takes a panoramic view of the history of the world's great religions and philosophies. It encompasses a comparison of the various human religions and God's revelation of Himself to man in Christ and the Bible.

<i>LECTURE DEPARTMENT</i>

Le 101,102,201,202,301,302,401,402,501 & 502 Lecture

1 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

The Lecture Department is headed up and controlled by the President of West Florida Baptist Institute. This is a special time for all the students to be together in assembly and hear special lectures from the President, 3 hours per week, NOT CHAPEL SERVICES. There are visiting pastors and missionaries invited to come and lecture at this time to familiarize the students with our national work. We also have lecturers to come in and lecture on how to conduct funerals, fill out income tax forms, how to build buildings, how to work with our public officials, how to become a part of our communities and a number of other things that pertain to the Ministry.

<i>MISSION DEPARTMENT</i>

Mi 10012 A & B: Evangelism

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

The New Testament methods of evangelism are explored. The areas of evangelism covered will be personal, church wide, pulpit, modern day outreach, and mass evangelism.

Mi 30023 A & C: Missions

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

A study will be given to biblical and historical missions, including a study of certain missionaries. The students will also learn about faith promise giving to missions.

<i>MUSIC DEPARTMENT</i>

Mu 10012 A: Beginner's Music

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This is a basic course in the fundamentals of music. Areas of study include: scales, interval, notation, key signature, and rhythmic studies. The student is required to attend a Christmas cantata and write a term paper.

Mu 10012 A: Conducting

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This is a basic course in conducting, beat patterns, time signatures, and ear training. The student will be expected to sight-sing, take dictation, and conduct from records, tapes, and congregational singing.

Mu 20032 A & B: Music Theory

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This is a continuation of the beginning music class with further advancement in scales, intervals, key signature and minor scales. In the first term, the student is required to write a term paper on a cantata, and the second term the student is required to write a term paper on a church music author.

Mu 30052 A & B: Church Music History

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This is a brief history of the composers of our many hymns. A term paper is required on one of our many authors in our hymn books.

Mu 40072 A & B: Music Form & Analysis

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This is an advanced study in music. The student will be expected to analyze hymns and describe the different forms of music.

<i>PASTORAL PRACTICALITIES DEPARTMENT</i>
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Pp 10012 A & B: Ministerial Practicalities

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This course acquaints the student with a knowledge in the field of Pastoral Psychology as it relates to Bible principles. A knowledge in this field prepares the student for more efficiency in pastoral endeavors.

Pp 20022 A, B & C: Defense of the Faith

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

Defense of the Faith is an apologetic study of Baptist doctrine which establishes a foundation for further advancement in "...the faith once delivered to the saints."

Pp 30023 A, B, & C: Pastoral Psychology

3 Semester Hours (48 CH) Each

This course is designed to teach the future pastor or Christian worker the professional techniques of case studies and suggested steps are covered. It challenges the student to integrate Christian principles and counseling techniques in helping those in need.

Pp 50024 A , B, C: God, Marriage and Family

3 semester hours (48) hours Each

This course is designed to enhance the ability for a student to excel in the field of counseling.

<i>COMMUNICATION DEPARTMENT</i>
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Co 10012 A & B: Homiletics

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This course is designed to teach the student the various methods and principles of building sermons and lessons outlines. The course covers the various types of outlines such as: Narrative, Textual, Topical, Question, and Expository.

Co 20022 A & B: Speech I

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This is a study of the fundamentals of speech. Types of speech, methods, mechanics, diction, and enunciation are covered in this course.

Co 30032 A & B: Speech II

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

This is a second year course in the study of the fundamentals of speech. Types of speech, methods, mechanics, diction, and enunciation are covered in this course.

Co 30043 A & B: Christian Journalism

2 Semester Hours (32 CH) Each

Christian Journalism is an elective course that deals almost exclusively with publication work. This class serves as the publication tool for the school publications like the newsletter, spanish literature, and other school publications. Entrance into this class requires a good record in the English courses and selection by the faculty.
